- (A) UNESCO has signed a pact with Himachal Pradesh state government to set Design University for Gaming. The UNESCO delegates stated that Gaming Technology will be the best source of income in future and IT giants.
- 2. (A) Cod liver oil is a dietary supplement derived from liver of cod fish.
- 3. (C) Cornwallis, who came to India as Governor-General in 1786. He created the Covenanted Civil Service of India which later came to be known as the Indian Civil Service. The Permanent Settlement was introduced by Lord Cornwallis in 1793.
- 4. (A) Mitosis is the cell cycle process by which chromosomes in a cell nucleus are separated into two identical sets of chromosomes, each in its own nucleus. Motosis occurs only in eukaryotic cells and the process varies in different organisms.
- 6. (B) Gujarat state government has launched "Poshan Abhiyan" to eradicate malnutrition among girls in the age group of 14 to 18. 'Purna' stands for Prevention of under Nutrition and Reduction of Nutritional Anaemia among Adolescent Girls.
- 8. (B) The waves that help scientists to understand the internal structure of the earth are secondary waves.
- 9. (B) The The Montague-Chelmsford Reforms or more briefly known as Mont-Ford Reforms were reforms introduced by the British colonial government in India to introduce self-governing institutions gradually to India. The reforms take their name from Edwin Samuel Montagu, the Secretary of State for India during the latter parts of World War I and Lord Chelmsford, Viceroy of India between 1916 and 1921. The reforms were outlined in the Montagu-Chelmsford Report prepared in 1918 and formed the basis of the Government of India Act 1919.

- (B) Aspirin is a common antipyretic.
 Antipyretics are substances used to bring down body temperature during high fever.
- 14. (A) Lingaraja Temple is one of the oldest temples in Bhubaneswar, Odisha.
- 15. (B) The earth completes one rotation on its axis in 23h 56min 4.9second.
- 16. (B) Warren Hastings was the first Governor-General of Bengal.
- 17. (C) Dropsy is an abnormal collection of fluid in any part of the body. It is usually caused due to the adulteration of mustard oil with argemone oil.
- 22. (C) Frontal rainfall is a type of precipitation which occurs when a warm air mass and a cold air mass meet. Extra-tropical cyclones form as waves along wither fronts before occluding later in their life cycle as cold core cyclones. Cyclogenesis is the development or strengthening of cyclonic circulation in the atmosphere (a low-pressure area).
- 23. (D) The World's first all-digital art museum has opened at the MORI Building Digital Art Museum in Tokyo, Japan.
- 26. (B) The 2018 World Sports Journalists day is observed on 2 July. This day has been earmarked as the official day because of its significance as the date when the International Sports Press Association (ISPA) was established at the 1924 Paris Olympics.
- 29. (B) The Sargasso Sea is a region of the North Atlantic Ocean bounded by four currents forming an ocean gyre. The Sargasso Sea is characterized by Very warm water
- 30. (A) The Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India is an authority, established by the Constitution under Constitution of India/Part V Chapter V/Sub-part 7B/Article 148, which audits all receipts and expenditure of the Government of India and the state governments, including those of bodies and authorities substantially financed by



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the government. The CAG is ranked 9th and enjoys the same status as a judge of

Supreme Court of India in Indian order

of precedence.

- 32. (A) India's first Global Mobility Summit will be organised by NITI Aayog in New Delhi. will This Summit help drive Government's goals for vehicle electrification, renewable energy integration and job growth and also speed up India's transition to a clean energy economy.
- 35. (A) The Bhakti movement refers to the theistic devotional trend that emerged in medieval Hinduism and later revolutionized in Sikhism. It originated in the seventh-century Tamil south India (now parts of Tamil Nadu and Kerala), and spread northwards. It swept over east and north India from the 15th century onwards, reaching its zenith between the 15th and 17th century CE.
- 37. (B) 7th and 31st constitutional amendments are related to raising the number of member of Lok Sabha to be elected from the state. Amendments increase the elective seats of lok sabha from 525 to 545. The upper limit of representatives of the state goes from 500 to 525 and that of the union territories decreases from 25 to 20.
- 39. (C) MSF is the rate at which banks can borrow overnight from RBI. This was introduced in the Monetary Policy of RBI for the year 2011-2012. The MSF has pegged 100 bps of a per cent above the repo rate. Banks can borrow funds through MSF when there is a considerable shortfall of liquidity. This measure has been introduced by RBI to regulate short-term asset liability mismatches more effectively been introduced by RBI to regulate short-term asset-liability mismatches more effectively.
- 40. (C) The Centre has announced a state-ofthe-art e-waste recycling unit for Bangalore, India's technology capital which produces an estimated one lakh tone of electronic waste a year.

- 41. (D) Dengue fever is a mosquito-borne tropical disease caused by the dengue virus. Symptoms typically begin three to fourteen days after infection. This may include a high fever, headache, vomiting, muscle and joint pains, and a characteristic skin rash.In a small proportion of cases, the disease develops into the life-threatening dengue hemorrhagic fever, resulting in bleeding, low levels of blood platelets and blood plasma leakage, or into dengue shock syndrome, where dangerously low blood pressure occurs.
- 44. (C) A Protem speaker is elected to handle the activities of the House. A Protem speaker is selected with by the Lok Sabha members and legislative assembly. The duty of a Pro-tem Speaker is to administer the oath of office to new members of the house.
- 47. (D) The famous Cultural festival "Behdienkhlam" 2018 was celebrated in Meghalaya. It is the most celebrated religious festival among the Pnars Tribals.
- 50. (D) Huangpu River flows through Shanghai.
- 54. (A) The Numaligarh Refinery is located at Assam in India. It is a joint venture between Bharat Petroleum (61.65%), Oil India (26%) and Government of Assam (12.35%).
- 55. (C) Plasma is one of the four fundamental states of matter, while the others are solid, liquid, and gas. Unlike these three states of matter, plasma does not naturally exist on the Earth under normal surface conditions, and can only be artificially generated from neutral gases. The term was first introduced by chemist Irving Langmuir in the 1920s.
- 56. (D) In fluid dynamics, Bernoulli's principle states that an increase in the speed of a fluid occurs simultaneously with a decrease in pressure or a decrease in the fluid's potential energy.
- 57. (C) The Zambezi is the fourth longest river in Africa, after the Nile, Congo, and Niger Rivers.

- 80. (C) Scurvy is the name for a vitamin C deficiency. It can lead to anemia, debility, exhaustion, spontaneous bleeding, pain in the limbs, and especially the legs, swelling in some parts of the body, and sometimes ulceration of the gums and loss of teeth.
- 81. (C) In economics, an inferior good is a good whose demand decreases when consumer income rises unlike normal goods, for which the opposite is observed.
- 82. (D) Australia Country's team has won the 2018 Men's Hockey Champions Trophy

- by defeating India. It was Australia's record 15th Champions Trophy title.
- 91. (A) The most sophisticated account of the economic drain-a basic characteristic of the Indian colonial economy-was made by Dadabhai Naoroji in 1871 in his book, Poverty and un-British Rule in India. The basic purpose of his study was to measure mass poverty which was a direct consequence of the economic drain. The essence of the drain theory is that the unilateral transfers that India was compelled to make to Britain systematically stripped the country of resources and thus perpetuated poverty.
- 93. (C) Chloramphenicol is an antibiotic useful for the treatment of a number of bacterial infections. This includes as an eve ointment to treat conjunctivitis.
- 95. (A) Carbon is capable of forming many allotropes due to its valency. Well-known forms of carbon include diamond and graphite. The most stable form of carbon is diamond.
- 96. (B) The Kuroshio Current is a warm ocean current flowing Northwards on the west side of the North Pacific Ocean. It is a strong Western boundary current. Generally, the currents flow northwards, in Northern hemisphere and Southwards in Southern hemisphere are warm ocean currents and the opposite are cold ocean currents.
